utreach to Haiti has maintained a 30-year presence to the Haitian people. As seen in these pages Outreach has consistently met needs in the critical areas of education, health care and nutrition. These programs, staffed exclusively by Haitian nationals, provide needed services and offer hope and opportunity.

Over the years we have also hosted countless international travelers who come to serve, learn and stand in solidarity with the Haitian people. A dental group from Connecticut runs a clinic each year often working with Haitian dental professionals. Doctors and nurses from other organizations support the work of mobile clinics and visit regularly to work with their Haitian counterparts. U.S. parishes are there regularly to work hand in hand with Haitian parishes and to support schools, clinics and economic development programs in urban and rural settings. Over the years, US engineers have assisted their Haitian counterparts in construction and water projects. Art therapists and psychologists were present after the 2010 earthquake to help people cope with the trauma of loss. Immersion groups experience the culture and realities of Haitian life and remain committed to the mission.

These are the guests who sit at our table and rest in the beds of our hospitality program and who make it an integral part of our mission.

Gift of NUTRITION

ike most days, a young mom brings her weak and listless child to the Ann Weller clinic. After taking height and weight measurements Rose Laure knows that she has a new patient for Outreach's nutrition program. Unfortunately she's seen cases like this many times. Over the next four to seven months, the child will make regular visits to the clinic to be examined and to receive a supply of food and supplements, needed prescriptions and vaccinations. Our health agents will make home visits to identify and correct safety and environmental issues. The clinical goal is to bring the child to normal weight and height for age. But Rose Laure is more than a clinician. Passionate about her job and a second mother to all the children in the program, her other goal is to see the child laugh and play. On average 100 malnourished infants and children graduate from our nutrition program each year.

Gift of EDUCATION & OPPORTUNITY

A nimportant goal of our education program is to help our students lift themselves out of poverty. With the unemployment rate at a staggering 60 percent, supporting oneself and a family in Haiti is a life-long challenge. As our relatively new post- secondary program matures, one measure of success is how many students obtain jobs in their field. To that end we offer seminars in leaderships, public speaking, resume writing and interview skills. Each student takes an aptitude test to identify interest and skills and receives counseling using the results. Over the last two years, 15 students held intern positions. The nursing student intern featured last year is now working full time at a major hospital in Haiti. One medical student graduating this year will begin practice. A language major is now teaching English at a secondary school and another young man works as a mechanic. Christelle, whose letter is shared on the front panel, will add to this growing list of success stories after graduation from her vocational school.

Cudgensley Dhonneur, pictured here, is 11 years old and one of our highest performing students. A soccer player whose class won the primary school championship, he aspires to someday be a pediatrician. We want that for him and he can take encouragement from the success of Christelle and others who have gone before him.

Gift of HEALTH CARE

Progress in our maternal and child health clinic continues while we wait for our new building to be constructed on the Christ Roi campus. The modest structure will only improve the level of service our Haitian medical staff provides and will better reflect the dignity of the people being served. In a country where scarce and largely unaffordable health care is the norm, patients choose our clinic for the compassionate care they know they will receive. Children are vaccinated at a rate much greater than the national average and our physicians can rely on the skills of our laboratory technician, and coverage by our health agents who walk the neighborhood identifying medical needs.

In October we began to expand the services provided to expectant mothers, by offering a program of nutritional assistance in addition to existing comprehensive pre-natal and post-natal care. We have just received a grant that will allow us to introduce an economic development component that will give the moms start up resources and training to better position them to care for their child.
